Remembrance day

At the recent Remembrance Day Service at St Mary's Church, a memorial plaque was dedicated in memory of Leonard Vowler who was killed in March 1945 when his plane was shot down. Aged just 21, he was the son of John and Mary Vowler of Church Green, Bickleigh. His nephew Rodney Vowler arranged with the Church authorities for the plaque and was joined at the service by his brother Alan Vowler and Cousin Janet Cox, together with their nephew and niece.

Leonard Vowler was born on 2nd October 1923 and lived with his family in Church Green. Len, having left school, worked initially with his father in the forge which was a reserved occupation. His parents would not give him permission to join up. To cover his interviews for the RAF, he told his parents that as he was in the ATC and the leader was leaving, he was doing courses to take over his job. To join, he said he was a year older than what he was. This rather miffed him as when he was actually 21, he could not celebrate it. When he left to start in the RAF in 1942, he arranged to be picked up in a lorry. He could not use the train as his sister controlled the signal box at the station.

After his initial training, he qualified as an Air Gunner RAF and was posted to 233 Squadron Royal Air Force at Oulton in Lincolnshire with promotion to the rank of Sergeant. The squadron flew the long-range bomber known colloquially as the Liberator.

On the night of the 20th March 1945, Len and the rest of the crew of 10 took off in their Liberator to carry out a special patrol over the German city of Kassel. Due back at base at 06:37 hours the following morning, the aircraft never returned. Len and his eight comrades were buried in the cemetery of the local town, Buhle in Germany. Len was twenty-one when he died.

I heard someone recently question whether we would still be remembering those who died in WW1 and WW2 in years to come. I believe we will. You only have to see the efforts made by so many to keep the memories of the war years and those involved alive, including the education of children and the sale of poppies which I note this year included football team poppy badges and knitted poppies including covers for post boxes!

The poppy is such a recognisable symbol of remembrance and hope for a peaceful future but of course, there are not many people now alive who were actually involved in the Great Wars but that doesn't mean that remembrance will cease. You don't have to have been there yourself to remember the sacrifices made by those who were there.

There are many examples of remembering events that we weren't actually part of through a symbol of some sort. The greatest example of these is the cross, the Christian symbol of suffering and defeat but also of triumph and salvation. The cross has been a Christian symbol for over 2000 years and is clear evidence that you don't have to have been there to remember.

The poppy has only been going for 100 years so I've no doubt it will be around for many, many years to come.

The market is also on the lookout for quality local musicians, performers and groups who are keen to share their talents.


